Why you should follow this course

Geography is the study of relationships between people and the earth. This course looks at current events, geographical issues and their impact on the environment, and will enable students to apply geographical knowledge, theory and skills to the world around them. The study of geography will challenge perceptions and stimulate investigative and analytical skills, it will highlight the importance of decision making and will help develop an awareness of the ethnic, cultural, economic and political diversity of human society.

Studying GEOGRAPHY gives you the opportunity to travel the world via the classroom...where will geography take you?

What will you cover during the course?

There will always be a balance of human and physical Geography. There is also a strong emphasis on field trips which includes a visit to a large city to study urban issues, and a residential field trip at the end of Year 12.



Students will learn case studies at various scales and will develop a wide range of quantitative and qualitative skills through the study of each module.
